All pupils in Key stage 4 who are eligible for Pupil Premium will achieve a qualification in Maths and English that is suitable for them.	Achieved – all PP pupils in year 11 achieved a Maths and English qualification appropriate for their ability.
100% of PP pupils will have the opportunity to access inspirational events and experiences, enrichment activities including exposure to arts, music, sports and cultural experiences.
